Somehow, there has been confusion in the watering department in our area this year and the seeds are sinking into soggy ground. I really don't know how the farmers and growers have coped this year with the rains. However, we may have a stunning autumn and a mild winter to turn things right round! As an insomniac, I often listen to the early morning farming news and apparently farmers say it has rained continuously since October 2023. 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THE SHELSLEYS PRE-RAPHAELITE FESTIVAL REVIEW

Following on from the photos published in the October TT.....Alexandra Winnington writes:

"This event took place at All Saints Church and was inspired by the story of the Rector David Melville and his family in the fascinating book "A Profound Secret" by Josceline Dimbleby. The book tells the story of the letters she discovered at a relative's house between eminent Pre-Raphaelite artist Edward Burne-Jones to the Rector's daughter, May Gaskell. He also wrote letters to the Rector and they had a mutual respect for each other. To mark the re-telling of this story and the contribution of the Rector David Melville in his transformative restoration of All Saints Church and the profound effect that pre-Raphaelite painter Edward Burne-Jones had on his daughter May

Gaskell and her children, a seminar was held in the church, with a number of academic speakers, as well as talks by local Shelsley residents. Holly Perks presented the input by the Rector at the church in the first block of talks.

Holly undertook a great deal of research which formed the backbone of the seminar and created the day's programme, incorporating all the related threads. The spirit of Melville and his sheer determination was also an inspiration for the day.

Dr Ann McLarnon delivered a very interesting overview of Melville's time at Hatfield College, Durham University, as Principal. It also covered his contribution to equal living opportunities at universities in general, and state education as we know it today. Holly also spoke on the Brasenose movement and the stained glass windows of William Wailes - one of which is attributed to him in the church.

Jude Bettinson presented a fascinating story about the Consistory Court and the restoration process of the church in order to gain power and permission for the work to go ahead. This involved taking the Churchwarden to Court for allowing the church to go into a state of serious disrepair. The power was granted for the Rector to go ahead with his plans. Bridget Francis gave an interesting talk on the Reformatory which David Melville initiated at Woodbury Hill. A very strict and busy day was scheduled to try and put order into offenders lives so that they were so busy they did not have time to think.

Bridget also discovered 2 paintings by Cuthbert Bede, the church artist, hidden away in the church. Within one is a face very similar to the Rector's and further research proved that he had been a student of the Rector during his time as Principal at Hatfield College, Durham University.

Dr Peter Doll gave a very interesting lecture on The Oxford Movement, the Gothic Revival and the architect James Cranston who drew up the restoration plans.

In the afternoon, Dr Serena Trowbridge spoke about the Pre-Raphaelite movement and artists of the time. Dr Philippa Semper spoke informatively on Edward Burne-Jones and brought us into his world both artistically and from a psychological perspective. Karl Harris spoke on the caricatures of Burne-Jones and the animals which have transpired into characters in modern day adaptations of Game of Thrones and other fantastical productions.

Kate Hurst spoke spontaneously and animatedly on Ruskinland, which was an anti-industrialisation movement to get back to and protect nature. The Rev Julia Curtis told us about the stained glass window at Rochford Church by William Morris and Alexandra Winnington stepped in on behalf of the Churchwarden at All Saints Church, Wilden, to talk about the numerous Edward Burne-Jones stained glass windows at that church.

The final block of the book and the letters within, was presented by Holly and Alexandra. The painting on the flyer by Edward Burne-Jones was discovered to link in with a beautiful letter about an extraordinary room that Burne-Jones wanted to create in "the chamber of his heart" for May, which only she may

enter and it would encompass "magical lands".

Presented around the church, an exhibition of Pre-Raphaelite pictures had been curated and presented by the Committee and documented by Susie James. The plans found in The Hive, and many drawings were also presented by Holly Perks, along with many copies of the letters featured in the book. Three pieces were kindly lent

a graveture by Burne-Jones; Rector David Melville's Bible as used by him in the 1850s; and a print of the beautiful and mysterious Amy Gaskell, by Burne-Jones, wearing a now famous 'black' dress.

The day in the church ended with a Compline Service with Rev Jen Denniston,

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where we celebrated God's creation and God's creative spirit that inspires us to create. Tim Goodall played the organ for a special time of singing for our gathering in the chancel.

Meanwhile, all day outside the church there was a great deal happening in the Art Tent run by Mel Williams and greatly assisted by Jen Denniston. Tiles inspired by William de Morgan were painted by children and adults, some stained glass windows and some pictures inspired by the Pre-Raphaelites. Much mirth was shared by visitors dressing-up in the variety of clothes available and photos taken.

The refreshments were superb with a hog roast provided by Kate Gunn from Clifton and a Waffle Van whose array of toppings made a delicious sweet course. The food tent offered quiches and salads for lunch, followed by tea and cake in the afternoon.

Huge thanks to everyone who helped to make the day such a success - from lending and putting up the marquees and tents, assisting with the exhibition, and lending and operating the technical equipment. Also to all those who made and served food and all the volunteers on hand to assist with virtually anything needed.

We were blessed with a dry day and visitors came from the local area with some children and other visitors from Malvern, Worcester and the surrounding environs. Both Ben Gaskell and Jo Hardy came and represented the family as Josceline Dimbleby's brother and sister. A film was made of the interview by Holly and Alexandra at Josceline's home and filmed very kindly by Diamondback Pictures. It will be more widely available to see soon. The film was shown that evening at Harborough Bank in Shelsley Beauchamp, where the Rector once lived, and formed part of an evening reception with two of our day speakers

delivering further talks. A caricaturist and direct descendant, the great-great grandson of Edward Burne-Jones, came specially from London. Our thanks to James and Holly Perks for providing the venue for a wonderful evening.

TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE GROUP

The photograph shows a field sown with sunflowers and other seed-producing plants, against the splendid backdrop of the Clee Hills. After writing earlier in the year about the seed mixes farmers use to support pollinating insects,



I hadn't expected to be following it with a few words about plants grown for birds. However, the use of "cover crops", "herbal leys" and "green manures" by farmers and gardeners alike is becoming more common.

The idea behind such crops is to employ natural methods to improve the fertility and structure of the soil. By ploughing plants back in at the end of the season, soil humus levels can be usefully increased. In addition, deep-rooted plants can help to loosen compacted ground and nitrogen-fixing plants can help restore nutrient levels. It is hoped that less artificial fertiliser will be needed to grow a subsequent cereal crop. That birds, insects and small mammals get a boost from cover crops is a secondary, but very welcome, benefit.

Sunflowers are always lovely to see and were very successful when the Teme Valley Wildlife Group grew a bird seed mix in a field at Eastham some years ago. The sunflower gets its name from the fact that its flower heads turn to face the sun and gradually move by the hour as the sun travels across the sky. Although it is probably the largest flower in Britain to exhibit this behaviour, it is by no means the only one. Bright red field poppies do the same.

Some flowers open when the sun is shining and close when it goes in. The tiny flower of the scarlet pimpernel opens at about 8 in the morning and closes at 2 in the afternoon, earlier if it is dull, and has acquired the name "poor man's weather-glass" because of this. Similar behaviour is exhibited by goat's beard, a tall dandelion-headed flower which opens in the morning but has shut by noon. This plant also goes by the name of "Jack-go-to-bed-at-noon". Quite why these plants act as they do, I'm not really sure. Some flowers need to protect their pollen against rain and shut up in damp conditions, wood anemones do this, but why flowers shut up for the afternoon I do not know.

Another fascinating fact is that some types of water lily sink their buds under water over night which then rise up at daybreak to open, before closing and sinking again in the evening. The Nile lily was observed to do this by the ancients who saw it as a symbol of resurrection, dying every evening and being reborn every morning in the eternal cycle of death and resurrection.

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
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
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School governors have three main roles:

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- Governors oversee the financial performance of the school and make sure its money is well spent. Governors examine budgets and spending proposals to monitor whether the school is getting value for money and ensure the money is spent in the right areas.

Our governors come from our local community and in their role they:

- get to know the school, including visiting the school occasionally during school hours and in agreement with the Headteacher, and gaining a good understanding of the school's strengths and weaknesses.
- attend induction training and regular relevant training and development events.
- attend meetings (approximately four full governing board meetings and three committee meetings a year) and read all the papers before the meeting.
- · act in the best interests of all the pupils of the school.
- behave in a professional manner, as set down in the governing board's code of conduct, including acting in strict confidence.




THREE PEAKS CHALLENGE

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


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CLIFTON-UPON-TEME PARISH COUNCIL

Minutes of the meeting held 3 October 2024 at Clifton Village Hall

Present: J. Bowden (Chair), B. Gilbert (Vice-Chair), R. Neave, P Brooks, S.Haywood.

Also present: District Councillors Paul Cumming, Sarah Simcock (Clerk) and x5 members of the Public. **Apologies:** County Cllr D. Chambers, Pam Cumming and L Merrick. **Declarations of Interest:** None.

The Minutes of the Meeting held 5 September 2024: Proposed by Cllr Gilbert; seconded by Cllr Neave. All agreed.

Matters arising: 63.24 Cllr J Bowden still waiting to hear from Mark Hammond. John Bowden is to meet Tanya from highways about the post for speed monitor and to talk about the speed limits. Also, The Threshing Barn has been approved even after we wrote in with our concerns about it.

Democratic Public Time: Member of the public asked about the bad accident.

County & District Councillor Reports: The County Councillors had nothing to report. District Councillor Paul Cumming gave a verbal report. SWDPR everything is just about ready to go to the inspector. Transport survey not quite ready. Discussed the neighbourhood development plan.

Finance & Governance Matters: Payments and receipts schedule – proposed Cllr Gilbert, seconded Cllr Haywood. All agreed. Clerk to process payments and to check VAT.

Section 106 matters: John Bowden still waiting for quotes from builders. Richard is continuing with the planning application. The final wildflower garden: Bruce Gilbert said the garden is starting very soon and have had site meetings about the fencing and paths. Wildflowers have been ordered. Pavilion updates: still waiting on prices from three contractors. Richard Newman is continuing planning permission for the new extending pavilion.

Parish Matters /Updates: Village Maintenance Plan – John Bowden noticed the large planter by the gateway at Church House Farm has been moved. John Bowden has sent a picture to Rob Wilkes to move it back in place. Paul Brookes mentioned that a footpath going up towards the school is overgrown and slippery - John Bowden to ask Rob Wilkes to have a look at it. Hanging Baskets have been removed. Three new bins to be ordered and to be placed by the bus stop outside Church House Farm, by the village hall and near Hope Lane. Swift boxes – Cllr Gilbert reported that over twenty two boxes have been ordered and some have been put in place and there has been positive feedback. Regarding the bit of land by Kenelm Road for a possible bus shelter - John Bowden spoke to the legal department at Persimmon Homes and

discussions to obtain the land are still ongoing. Project (CFAF) updates: John Bowden said that he noticed the horse on the playing field needs refurbishing and he is waiting on a price for it. It was mentioned that the seesaw is too near to the fence.

PSCO Quarterly Review completed by Bruce Gilbert to include the hazard parking outside school, speeding on the B4204 and rural crime. The grit bins are to be checked.

Planning Matters: Nothing to report.

Strategic Planning Matters: A verbal update earlier in the meeting from Cllr Paul Cumming.

Highways Matters: Cllr Haywood reported that some road signs by Old Road are overgrown - John Bowden to talk to Tanya from highways. Ray Neave asked whether to consider extending the double yellow lines which are from Pound Lane to the back entrance of the school and extend to the entrance to Blue Shot.

Councillor Reports & Items for Future Agendas: Nothing to note.

There being no further business, the meeting closed at 9pm.

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SWIFT BOXES IN CLIFTON

More than 30 swift boxes have so far been fitted to properties in Clifton and there are plans to add some to St Kenelm's Church to increase the numbers of swifts that nest in the church tower.

Simon Evans of the Worcester Branch of the RSPB said: "We are delighted to work with the residents of Clifton-upon-Teme and their Parish Council to try to maintain the presence of the wonderful swifts who give so much pleasure during the summer months. The numbers are currently declining but we hope to reverse that trend by providing more nesting sites with the addition of the swift boxes within the village."



"It may take two or three years before we start to see the benefit of our work, but the boxes are made of marine ply and are varnished and will last over twenty years, so we are looking at a long term increase in swift numbers. I'd like to thank all the villagers who have come forward and purchased the boxes and the Parish Council who have paid for their installation."

Church Matters

It's the beginning of November and once again we enter a period when we try to remember those lost in conflict and offer help to the families of those in the services.

Once again, we see conflict in Europe and the Middle East. Again, man fights man. Why?

We have guidance and teachings in all the major religions of the world but we heed them not; and we do this at our peril.



Here is an appropriate poem, read by the late Pat Bradley at the Remembrance service at St. Kenelm's in 2007.

Remembrance poppies will be on sale throughout the area from the end of October and there will be Remembrance services at all of our churches. By buying a poppy we remember, but does mankind learn?

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
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
