CLIFTON PARISH COUNCIL LATEST

Reminder to dog owners: After receiving reports of local sheep being bitten and harmed by dogs on public rights of way through local fields, Clifton Parish Councillors issued a reminder to local dog owners to ensure their dogs are under control at all times when using footpaths, particularly during the lambing season. While dogs do not have to be on a lead on a public right of way, they must be under control. If the owner cannot ensure this then the dog should be kept on a lead, and a landowner can request that such a dog is put on a lead. This clearly applies where the dog is not sticking to a footpath and trespassing on neighbouring land. To protect sheep, other farm animals and ground-nesting birds, dogs should be kept on a fixed length lead, no more than two metres long, between 1 March to 31 July, and at any time in the vicinity of livestock. Regardless of the time of year, the requirement for dogs to be under control remains. A farmer is allowed to kill a dog if it is worrying livestock.

Parish precept increase: A proposal to increase the parish precept by 10% was agreed at the January meeting of Clifton Parish Council, adding approximately £9.70 to the average annual council tax bill for households in the parish.

Playground rocking horse: Parish councillors agreed to spend £1,400 on restoring and preserving the old rocking horse (pictured right) within the newly equipped children's playground in Clifton. "The old horse still attracts many children," said Lyn Merrick. "As we still have ours, the plan is to restore it as much as possible. Its days of vigorous rocking may be over, but many children will continue to have fun riding on it."

STANFORD CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL GOES DOWN A STORM

The annual Christmas Tree Festival at St Mary's Church in Stanford Bridge on 7 and 8 December was a great success, despite coinciding with Storm Darragh



raging. Alexandra Winnington confirmed: "The church was full of trees — a wonderful sight that brightens the darkest days of winter! Unfortunately the storm caused two power cuts, including one in the middle of our Church Carols... but candles were lit and we just carried on without the organ playing!" The Archdeacon of Worcester, the Rev Canon Mark Badger, judged the trees. Clifton Primary School's tree (pictured) was awarded the children's trophy and Brockhill Estate won the adult's trophy. The people's vote went to Abberley Nursery School. The money raised will be shared with Clifton Scouts for their hut campaign.

LOCAL VET ON THE FOREFRONT OF RHINO CONSERVATION

Great Witley-based veterinary surgeon, Dr. Miriam Lodewyks, has been raising funds to support a variety of wildlife projects including otter rehabilitation, hedgehog rescue, a water-vole research project along the banks of the River Teme and more recently a South African rhino sanctuary. Miriam, whose sister in Shelsley Beauchamp is also a vet, is the founder of UK-registered wildlife conservation charity: Animal Saviours. Through this she has been organising small groups of passionate



individuals to go to a rhino sanctuary and research centre in South Africa, to help with the annual horn-trimming procedures that reduce the risk of poaching of these iconic species by about 80%. Miriam told *Teme Triangle*: "Rhino horn is much like fingernails and grows a couple of inches per year. It is highly prized in many Asian countries, but it is illegal to trade rhino horn so poaching is now the only way to obtain it. This has driven the value of the horn through the roof, and the species ever closer to extinction."

The volunteers who travel to South Africa with Animal Saviours help to protect a small enclave of Southern White Rhino, physically helping with data collection and horn-trimming (the wild rhinos are first sedated with a dart gun by an experienced vet, from a helicopter) as well as funding their anti-poaching patrol team, which comprises 13 people, two Bloodhounds, four German Shepherds and four Belgian Malinois. Whilst in Africa the volunteers learn about what it takes to maintain a healthy ecosystem that can support not only the rhino, but also giraffe, buffalo, ostriches, various antelope and countless bird, reptile and insect species. Animal Saviours has also helped fund multiple local projects that aim to benefit endangered British wildlife, such as hedgehog, otter, bird and bat rescues. When not in Africa, Miriam provides a mobile, in-home, end-of-life care service to the pets of Worcestershire and Herefordshire (called Dignipets). CLIFTON TO HOST EVENING OF OPERATIC ARIAS FOR UKRAINE

A limited number of tickets are available for an evening of opera at The Hope, Clifton-upon-Teme, on Friday 14 March at 6.30pm. Valery Sherlock, an accomplished Ukrainian soprano who lives in Martley, will give a charity recital of works by Verdi, Mozart, Puccini and Tchaikovsky, as well as Ukrainian songs. Also performing is her bass-baritone husband Kieran Sherlock. The event is



hosted by kind permission of Candy and Shane Connolly, with the proceeds going to Valery's native Ukraine, to support the ongoing efforts since the Russian invasion. Jerry Johns, who is coordinating tickets, said: "Valery is a sensational soprano whose spectacular recital should leave you in awe. It promises to be a night to remember, and a unique opportunity to experience the magic of live opera."

An academy-trained operatic soprano, Valery began her musical path in her native Ukraine. She graduated from music school in piano class, Odessa Music College in vocal class and finally the Odessa Music Academy Opera vocal programme. She came to the UK from Ukraine nearly four years ago. Kieran Sherlock, a field archaeologist from Martley,

was greatly influenced as a child by Pavarotti and the Three Tenors performing Nessun Dorma during World Cup Italia 90. He began singing in 2018 receiving Operatic vocal tuition from South African tenor Wilhelm Theunisen and made his performance debut in 2019 at Huntingdon Hall. He shares the same bass baritone voice type as Welsh Opera great Bryn Terfel. Their accompanist is David Archer, who spent five years accompanying instrumentalists and singers at the Birmingham Conservatoire, and is a musical director in local amateur dramatic societies as well as a rehearsal pianist for Worcester opera societies. 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LIFE ON THE FARM

Occasional column from local farmer Allan Jeffries

2024 went so quickly that I think every month must have been about five days shorter and we were all so busy we didn't notice! It was quite a difficult year being a sheep

farmer and I think most sheep farmers would agree. Most of the problems were weather-related. My Dad used to say you forget those difficult times when you get some nice warm sunny days and the lambs are running and skipping around the fields. Spring always meant hearing the cuckoo, with great competition to see who would hear it first, but together with a lot of other bird species, numbers of cuckoos are falling fast and some years I don't even hear one.

Last autumn we didn't buy quite so many yearling ewes to replace what we term the cull ewes. These are ewes who are getting older and losing their teeth (a lot of farmer's wives seem to disappear off to the dentist at this time of the year!) or perhaps have had mastitis and so would not be able to rear lambs again the following year. There are always the odd one or two ewes who for some reason just don't have a lamb and so there is no point keeping them for another year. As the yearlings were quite expensive last autumn, we decided to keep some of the older ewes for another year even if their teeth weren't too good!

We have just pensioned off one of our pet ewes who, about ten years ago, was chased by a neighbour's dog and in her panic crashed headfirst into a fence post with such force that she actually broke the fence post off. She damaged her front leg quite badly and couldn't stand. It took a month of special care, turning her several times a day until eventually it paid off and she managed to get back on her feet. It is a very satisfying feeling to see the reward of all your hard work. It's a certain fact it's not about the money, but don't tell the vet it's a pet, or you'll pay the same rate as for cats and dogs! She went on to have really good lambs every year until we felt she was too old to go to the ram this time. We put the rams into the ewes in the first week of October so should start lambing around the beginning of March. This year the ewes were what we term as lacking a bit of condition, or in other words were a bit thinner than most years. Again, this was weather-related.

The snow in November took us by surprise! The first thing I noticed that morning was that Bryn (the sheepdog) wouldn't get out of bed. I suspect he had jumped up on the draining board in the utility room to steal the cat's food, saw the snow and, like my good friend Trev, decided it called for a lazy day in the warm! We sold the last of the lambs at Tenbury sheep sale four days before Christmas. Leading up to Christmas, I help our friend David Moore with delivering his turkeys. Fi (my wife) was getting very excited with the thought of all the money I was earning, expecting a very nice Christmas present... until I reminded her that even after twenty years, David said he's still teaching me the job and so can only afford apprentice rates and he definitely hasn't heard of the minimum wage! This year I might have to ask John Richards at Wichenford for a week's work.

Wishing everyone a good, and more importantly healthy, 2025.

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
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CLIFTON-UPON-TEME PARISH COUNCIL

Minutes of the meeting held 9th January 2025 at Clifton upon Teme Village Hall

Present: J. Bowden (Chair); B. Gilbert (Vice-Chair); R. Neave; P Brooks & L Merrick Also present: District Councillor Paul Cumming, Sarah Simcock (Clerk) and x3 members of the Public Apologies: County Cllr D. Chambers, District Councillor Pam Cumming & Sid Haywood Declarations of Interest: None. The Minutes of the Meeting held 5th December 2024: Purposed P Brooks seconded by R Neave Matters arising: Paul Brooks has checked both defibrillators work and on the BHF website and work from a mobile even if you have no mobile signal. There will be signs made and placed outside each defibrillator explaining this. Paul Brooks is to pass on information to clerk to order a spare battery. Bruce Gilbert has reported to BT about the public phone box not working. John Bowden has written to the water company about the meters and the matter is still ongoing.

DEMOCRATIC PUBLIC TIME: A member of the public asked a question if there was any news on the proposed planning of the fifty-five houses. There have been many meetings on the questions that SWDP has posed to the inspector. They are having various meetings in the guildhall going through the questions. The parish council have suggested finding out if anyone can attend the meetings to get more information. County & District Councillor Reports: The County Councillors report was read out by the chairman. County Councillor Paul Cumming gave a verbal report on many changes within the council. SWDP the extra information has now been provided to the inspectors. Electric charging stations: Paul Cummings will ask to see if we can acquire funding but need to find out cost, how many people would use it and what power point and where the charging stations would be placed. Finance & Governance Matters: Payments and receipts schedule - proposed Cllr Paul Brooks, seconded Cllr B Gilbert. All agreed. Section 106 matters - John Bowden has not heard back from MHDC about the possibility of using the 106-funding money for planning. John Bowden asked Richard Newman if there was someone who could put a budget together. he said yes, his QS would do this for £375.00+VAT proposed by John Bowden seconded Paul Brooks all agreed. The final wildflower garden: Bruce Gilbert spoke about an email he had off Becca saying would you like to put in an interim claim because we have already paid for bits for the garden Bruce and Lyn will be meeting with Becca on Tuesday. Lyn mentioned the trees have arrived and also mentioned a memorial tree will be planted with a plaque for Bradley and also having a wildlife garden open day. We will have a formal open day for the new facilities for the sporting and children's playground MH council definitely want to come to this but it's postponed while the wildlife garden is being done. Councillors Cumming. **Declaration of Interests.** Councillors Stinton, Bates and Belfield re Village Hall. **Minutes:** With one item requiring clarification, the minutes of the meeting held on November 14th 2024 were agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairwoman. She reported that she had received an apology from Councillor Warren for

leaving the November meeting. **Public Question Time:** The question referred to highways and was dealt with under that heading.

Midland Automobile Club: No report, a representative from the MAC will attend the March meeting.

Highways and Footpaths: Lengthsman: Two time sheets, invoice for November and December and a report have been received. There was much discussion on the poor state of the roads in the parish. Since the last meeting WCC have agreed to place warnings of pedestrians but this has not been done yet. Clerk to pursue.

WCC response to flood indication poles was declined, saying drivers drove at their own risk through flood waters. However after the request for flood warning triangles at New Mill Bridge these had been placed by the roadside.

The clerk has reported to WCC the crumbling and dangerous road edge by the Shelsley Beauchamp bungalows. Photos will be submitted along with another urgent request for the edge to be repaired.

The lengthsman will be asked to clear the drains in the dip by the village hall and to remove mud ingress at the sides of the road. All grit bins are full, the only one used is at the Kingswood B4203 junction.

There was some discussion on parking by the church, especially on the bend.

Village Hall: The PC liaison Councillor reported a conversation with the Charity Commission where it appears that the Village Hall Trustees are able to change the rules in the governing document, a copy of which is held by the Commission.

Urgent Decisions: The clerk in consultation with councillors submitted the following decisions to MHDC regarding M/24/01598/CU & M/24/01597/LB Shelsley Grange. The PC neither supported nor objected to the application but made comments. M/24/01643/LB Hill Climb. The PC supported the application.

Planning: M/24/01290/HP at 7 The Bungalows Shelsley Beauchamp. Erection of single storey side and rear extension and new entrance porch has been approved.

Correspondence: The Police Charter was discussed and completed.

Finance: Bank balance currently £4,543.14. The Lengthman's invoice and the Clerk's expenses were agreed. Bank balance is £6,748. **Precept:** It was agreed to increase this from £7,000 to £8,000.

Councillors' reports and items for future agenda: A Shelsley Nature Walk has been rearranged for April 6th at 11am. Details to be placed in the Teme Triangle. The Chairwoman reported on an online meeting "Councils as Trustees" which added to the information from the liaison officer above. The meeting concluded at 21.25.

May you all have a safe and healthy February and then we can surely look forward to the Spring!

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
Church Matters

'Continuity': the fact of something continuing for a long period of time without being changed or stopped. Year in and year out, the seasons come and go and the

and as you read, this event may well seem like a while ago.



In the church calendar we have celebrated the birth of Jesus, then in January the arrival of the Magi or Wise Men and now on the 2nd February it's Candlemas. Here we celebrate the presentation of the baby Jesus in the Temple and purification of his mother Mary. This day marks the completion of forty days since his birth. Joseph and Mary bring the baby into the temple where there are two people, who for many years, have been awaiting this moment. A fragile old man named Simeon, who acclaims the baby as 'the light to enlighten the nations' and with him is the prophet Anna who proclaims Jesus as her Redeemer.

The festival of Candlemas is celebrated with lots of lighted candles. These lights signify that 'Jesus is the light shining in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it'. These words were announced forty days ago in the reading from John's gospel that was read at Christmas services in churches across the world. At Candlemas Anna takes on the role of evangelist, preaching to all the people of God that the Messiah has come to redeem the world. Simeon and Anna have seen salvation with their own eyes, they hand this salvation on to others, on to us, and this becomes our role too. 'Continuity' – here over 2000 years on we are called to share that light, the message of hope and salvation to all the world.
